

## THEATER TERMS & DEFINITIONS

- Act: a major division of a play. Acts may be further divided into scenes. May be used to indicate a change in time or place.
- Action: the movement in the play from the initial entanglement through the rising action, climax, and falling action to resolution
- З. Actor: one who performs a role or represents a character in a play
- Angel: the financial broker of a production. Formerly a single wealthy person or small group of people. Now 4. producers look to large corporations for backing
- Antagonist: the character who provides the obstacle to the 5 . protagonist's objective in the play. The antagonist sets the conflict in motion
- Apron: the area of the stage in front of the curtain line 6.
- Aristotle's Six Elements of drama: character, diction, music, plot, spectacle, thought

  Audition: the opportunity to read for a part in a play 7.

- Auditorium: the part of the theater building that holds the 9. audience, also called the house

  Backdrop: a flat surface the width of the stage, usually
- 10. made of canvas hanging from the flies at the rear of the staging area and painted to represent the desired setting
- Backing: flats, screens, and drops used backstage to mask the audience's sight lines through the door and windows f the set
- 12. Backstage: the area behind the set or backdrop that is not sees by the audience
- Bit, bit part: a small role consisting of very few lines and 13. a brief stage appearance
- Blocking: determining the basic movements of the actors during a play. Some is provided by the playwright; some develops by actors; but a majority is supplied by director

  Booked flat: two flats lashed together and opened at an
- angle for form a "V"

  Boom: also called a boomerang; a vertical pipe used to mount a spotlight. Also a pole used to extend a microphone over a set

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
