	1867	Confederation.
	1872	The Dominion Lands Act offers free land in the Canadian West.
	1880 to 1885	15,000 Chinese brought to work on the British Columbia leg of the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR).
	1885	CPR completed, making it easier to travel to and settle in the Canadian West.
Gold found in the Klondike	1896	Clifford Sifton becomes Minister of the Interior and promotes immigration to the Canadian West. He declares that 500,000 stalwart peasants are needed to farm the west. Europe and North America need sources of hard wheat.
	1899	The first (7,500) of five parties of Russians (Doukhobors) settle in Saskatchewan. In 1908, some move to British Columbia.
	1891 to 1914	170,000 Ukrainians arrive, attracted by free land, space and opportunity.
	1890s to 1914	Ethnic Germans from Russian and Austro-Hungarian empires and the Balkans arrive, including Mennonites, Lutherans, Roman Catholics.
	1901 to 1914	 Close to 1 million come from British Isles. 500,000 come from continental Europe. 750,000 come from the United States, including returning Canadians and Europeans (Germans, Hungarians, Swedes and Icelanders) who had settled there.
	1904	3,000 Italians arrive in Montréal, looking for work and entrepreneurial opportunity.
	1906	Work begins on Grand Trunk Pacific, Canadian Northern, and National Transcontinental railways.
	1904 to 1907	5,000 immigrants from India come to Vancouver and Victoria, to work mostly in logging camps and lumber mills.
	1907	Immigration Board pays \$2 bonus for every British agricultural labourer placed in Ontario and Quebec.
	1913	Record number (400,000) of newcomers arrive in a single year.
	1914	By 1914, only 10,000 Japanese had settled in Canada. Japan had restricted emigrating males to 400 per year.

	1923	 The Chinese Immigration Act: Asian immigration is prohibited. 1925 Railway Agreement: CPR and CNR allowed to recruit cheap European labour.
